Peter G. Tombros

Peter is chair of the For the Future campaign. He began his career with Pfizer where he worked for 25 years in a variety of positions including executive vice president of Pfizer Pharmaceuticals and corporate vice president for strategic planning. In 1994, he left Pfizer to join Enzon Pharma as president and CEO. Peter retired from Enzon in 2001 and until September 2005 served as chairman and CEO at VivoQuest, a private biotech company. Peter received his B.S. and M.S. degrees from Penn State and his M.B.A. from the University of Pennsylvania, Wharton School of Business. In 2006, Peter was selected for Penn State's highest honor, the Distinguished Alumni Award. Peter currently serves as an appointed Professor and Distinguished Executive in Residence, overseeing the Science B.S./M.B.A. Program in the Eberly College of Science. In addition, Peter and his wife, Ann, are native to Centre County and have supported the University Libraries, Intercollegiate Athletics, and the sciences. They are members of the Founders Society, the President's Club, the Mount Nittany Society, and the Laurel Circle.



E. Lee Beard

Lee is vice chair of the For the Future campaign and chair of the campus committees and served as chair of the Hazleton campaign during Grand Destiny. She is also principal and owner of The Henlee Group, LLC, a financial advisory company located in Drums, Pennsylvania. Throughout her career she has held senior-level executive positions in the banking industry and with auditing firms. In 1993 she moved to Hazleton, Pennsylvania, to be the president and CEO of First Federal Bank. The five-time national Coach-of-the-Year was selected for induction in 2006 into the National Football Foundation and College Football Hall of Fame—one of only three active coaches ever to do so. He and his wife, Sue, a 1962 Penn State graduate, have been active with numerous committees including the National Council for Penn State Philanthropy, the Grand Destiny Executive Committee, and the National Development Council. Sue was honored in 2004 with the Penn State Distinguished Alumni Award, the University's highest honor. The Paternos contributed their time and gifts to a building campaign where \$13.7 million was raised to make the Pattee and Paterno Libraries world-class among other universities.
